

## December Craft Club - Snowman Shadow Box

### Materials Provided:

Shadow Box- 5"x7"

"Snow Place Like Home" Cricut Cut Out

Snowflake tablecloth piece

Decorative Filler - White Balls

Alcohol wipes

### Not provided:

Gift card, Credit Card, or Bone Folder

Step 1 - Take the Shadow Box apart and wipe down each side of the glass with glass cleaner. Then use the alcohol wipe and wipe down the outside glass part. This will allow the vinyl to adhere to the glass pane better.

Step 2 - Burnish (rub hard) on the white/paper side of the vinyl cutout. We want the vinyl to stick to the contact paper not to the paper.


Step 3 - After you have burnished the vinyl, then slowly peel the paper away from the cut out. Be careful that all pieces come up. I find it best to keep my paper as flat as possible and SLOWLY pull it away. Hopefully if you have burnished hard enough it will easily come off and leave the vinyl sticking to the contact paper.

Step 4 - Adhere the vinyl to the shadowbox on the outside pane of glass. It is your box, you decide where you want it. You can center it, off set it, or put it in a corner. You decide your best placement.

Step 5 - Once the design is where you want it, carefully burnish it again on to the glass. Then slowly pull the contact paper away. You will want to have your "card" close in case you need to burnish it again while pulling the contact paper away.

Step 6 - Open the filler and pour in your desired amount into the inside of the shadow box. You can decide how much you need.

Step 7 - Remove the pins from the back of the shadow box. DO NOT discard them, you will need them again. I used a piece of blue cardstock paper, but you don't need to use it. Attach the snowflake table cloth piece to the back with the pins. Trim it to size. Then attach it to your shadow box.



Optional Options:

~ Stick fairy lights in your shadow box with the filler

~ Use Snowflake Cardstock paper instead of the table cloth piece as a background

~ Paint your Shadow Box to match your decor - I recommend multiple layers of acrylic paint or one layer of thick chalk paint (Waverly is a favorite brand)
